ACTIVITY ONE

Guided tour of the Old Rectory as house detectives





In groups of 10 pupils will be taken around the house by one of our expert guides. They will learn the story of the house and the Wesley family, with each group focussing on a particular character from the Wesley family. They will fill in a detective's log as they go. At the end of the tour they will compare notes with children who researched different family member from the other groups. Together they will make a case file on the whole family and solve the case of who lived in the house.

This will help them to understand

- The way that museums work
- How collections are cared for
- How stories can be expressed through objects, pictures and furniture
- The importance of the early upbringing of the Wesley family on their later lives
- An experience of being inside an early eighteenth century home and the discovery of differences between this house and modern homes

ACTIVITY TWO Costumed experience of home schooling in Susanna Wesley's kitchen (KS2 literacy and history unit 18)





A group of 10 pupils will be helped to imagine they are travelling back through 300 years of history as they meet Susanna Wesley.

She will be in eighteenth century costume and will explain to the children how she ran a school for her 10 children in the kitchen.

She will ask them to put on appropriate clothes for her school (costumes are all provided), and they will learn:

- Elements of literacy and language though copying the ancient Greek alphabet and considering some words using a slate
- Copying John Wesley's handwriting using a quill pen on parchment
- Elements of geography though considering an eighteenth century map of the world compared to a modern one.
- They will also discover a great deal about the way that Susanna Wesley brought up her children, and the norms of education for the period.

ACTIVITY THREE 'Plant detectives' in the Physic Garden (KS2 science 2b) Available from May to September







In the Summer months we can offer an activity allowing a group of 10 pupils to explore the John Wesley Physic Garden.

They will be taken to the garden and will learn about herbal remedies and how poorer people in the eighteenth century often had no access to medical care. John Wesley tried to offer home-spun cures in his book 'Primitive Physic'. Many of the plants he used are growing in our garden.

- Pupils will be given a sheet and asked to find certain plants, draw them, describe them and think about how they would have been used.
- The group will then return indoors to learn about and make a comfrey poultice (involving hands-on use of a pestle and mortar).

ACTIVITY FOUR Shock pots and loving cups (KS2 art 5b)





A group of 10 pupils will be taken to one of the rooms in the Old Rectory specifically to look at the shock pots and the loving cup. They will be allowed to handle a replica shock pot. They will learn why the pots were made. They will also be taught about the 'love feasts' of early Methodists and how a double handled loving cup was used to share water.

They will then have the chance to make their own loving cup or shock pot in clay. Schools will be given the pots to take away at the end of the day.

They will learn:

- How to handle precious objects
- How 'insects' were made within a tankard to shock people out of drinking too much, or as a joke.
- Why loving cups were made and how they were used.
- Craft skills with pottery
- Their own individual response through creating their own pot.

ACTIVITY FIVE Learning about portraits (KS2 art 3a)





A group of 10 pupils will be taken to look at several portraits of John and Charles Wesley and will learn why certain symbols and clothing are used in them. They will consider the expressions on faces and try to understand what the artist was trying to express.

They will answer questions on sheets about each portrait while they are looking at them.

Then in pairs they will interview each other, and discover each child's hobbies, interests, pets, and how they might like to be remembered. They will then draw a portrait of each other incorporating those elements.

They will learn:

- How artists can communicate
- The meaning of symbols
- The characters of John and Charles Wesley and elements of their history
- · How to listen carefully to another child
- How to understand more about each other than just the physical appearance
- How to translate a conversation into symbols and images.

RISK ASSESSMENT FOR EDUCATIONAL VISITS

Epworth Old Rectory is over three hundred years old. Risks to visitors have been minimised but it is essential for organisers to make a preliminary visit to the site to complete their own risk assessment for their specific group.

Prior to your visit, please inform museum staff of any individuals with special requirements.

School staff are responsible for the safe-keeping of inhalers or pupils' medication during the visit.

A copy of this notice should be given to each adult accompanying you on this visit.

Museum staff and/or volunteers will instruct the group on fire procedure at each museum.

Please brief both adults and pupils about the aims of your visit.

CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

- Group leaders will be responsible for the supervision of the group at all times.
- Pupils with statements of SEN, who need extra support, should have that support during the visit. The support staff should not be counted as part of the general ratios.
- All visitors will follow instructions or advice given by museum staff and volunteers.
- For some of the visit, pupils will be in 'role'. Therefore we request that there is no eating, drinking or use of mobile phones or cameras during the visit, except at allocated times and places.
- No running within the house or in the Physic Garden.

- Group leaders to be aware of any allergies or particular medical needs among the group, and to be prepared for any issues arising from these.
- Group leaders to remain with their groups throughout the visit.
- All are asked to move around the house and grounds carefully, and to take extra care over uneven ground, on the staircases and where floors are of different heights within the house.
- Emergency First Aid for the pupils is the responsibility of the group leaders.
- On occasions, a photographer may be present during your visit. Please sign the *Permission to Use Photographs* form if you have no objections, and inform museum staff when you arrive if there are any children whose families have not given consent for them to be photographed.
